ORDINANCE/RESOLUTION SUMMARY

This Resolution is to amend Resolution 2006-R118-126 by changing the membership of the Sister Cities Commission from 19 members to 13 members, to change the Council Standing Committee from Health, Human Services and Education to Governmental Operations and proposes to pursue and develop a Sister City relationship with Segou, Mali.

BACKGROUND

Created in 1980, the Sister Cities Commission (SCC) membership has been comprised of 19 members with members appointed by the Mayor. In 2006, Resolution 2006-R118-126 changed the appointment of the members of the Commission from Mayor to City Council. Since 2008 and after a brief period of inactivity, Council has appointed nine members to the Commission. The Commission recommends changing the membership of the Sister Cities Commission from 19 to 13 members to allow for a more cohesive work group and the ability to have all members present and in attendance at meetings for a quorum. As there are currently 9 members appointed to the Commission, there would be four vacancies.

On June 25, 2009, Council Staff recommended to the Governmental Operations Standing Committee to change the oversight of the Commission from the Health, Human Services and Education Standing Committee. The change is recommended because the Commission is better aligned with the Governmental Operations Committee because of its universal scope and oversight over issues that would fall under the auspices of City

Administration. Placement would allow an opportunity for staffing from City Administration and for the Commission to receive resource development. The Council Governmental Operations Standing Committee accepted this recommendation.

In accordance with Resolution 2006-R118-126, the Commission is charged with developing and fostering a sister city affiliation program through the auspices of Sister Cities International. Currently, Richmond has relationships established with six Sister Cities. On June 3, 2009, the Commission voted unanimously to recommend that Richmond invite the City of Segou, Mali to become Richmond Virginia's Sister City.

The Commission has collaborated with the Virginia Friends of Mali, a civic organization to facilitate a relationship with Segou, Mali. The Commission will build upon the relationship by the Friends of Mali with citizens of Segou, Mali. The Friends of Mali have initiated numerous successful visits and exchanges with teachers, students, diplomats, business people, musicians and general tourism. Virginia Friends of Mali has current relationships and the full support of the Malian Ambassador, H.E. Abdoulaye DIOP, Segou Mayor Ousmane SIMAGA, and the President of the Segou Council for Economic Development, Mr. Mamou DAFPE, and others in the economic, cultural and political communities.

In summary, a Sister City relationship between the cities of Richmond VA and Segou Mali, building on the commonalities of our experience, the historic and cultural relationships which have existed, and the opportunities to build further relationships in the areas of economic development and educational exchanges, will bring lasting gain to both Richmond and Segou.

Attached is a chart of Commonalities between Richmond, VA and Segou, Mali.

Recommendations are to Amend Resolution 2006-R118-126 as follows:

- To change the oversight of the Sister Cities Commission from Health, Human Services and Education to Governmental Operations Standing Committee
- To change the membership of the Commission from 19 to 13 members
- To pursue and develop a Sister City relationship with Segou, Mali as recommended by the Sister City Commission.
